Remembering to Remember By Jim Salmi

Despite some early morning cloud cover, the Memorial Day parade in downtown Denver on Saturday, May 23 went off on schedule and without a hitch. Our club was once again asked to drive the lady Marines, as has been our custom. The traditional meeting place has been the Albertson's parking lot at East Alameda and South Broadway, from which we left as a mini-caravan to Bannock and Colfax where the parade commenced.

Four lady Marines and four RMRCLC members constituted our human contingent, as well as three of our members' cars. Our fearless leader, John Serfling, brought his blue '63 Cadillac convertible, top dropped and looking long, wide and handsome as ever. The car, I mean. John Cullinan's canary yellow '38 LaSalle, which we all know and drool over, made the trip as well, and I continue to marvel at his admirable willingness to drive such a car in city and highway traffic to these events. Rounding out the RMRCLC trifecta was Larry Dilts and his spotless blue '90 Fleetwood Brougham, which Larry reports got an impressive 24 MPG on a recent trip to the Midwest. What's all this talk about C.A.F.E. standards for new cars? Why can't they just bring back some of the Golden Oldies? Oh well, another subject for another time. Yours truly rode shotgun with Larry.

Riding with John Cullinan was lady Marine Marge Muzzillo, who joined in November of 1943 and served until December of 1945, mostly at Camp LeJeune. Marge told of time spent in Alaska, Spain and Morocco, and of one Cold War drill that turned out to have been staged for the benefit of a visiting congressman, who wanted to see what one looked like. Some things never change.

Also riding along was Paula Sarlls, a Sergeant, who served from 1967 to 1971, working as an air controller. Quantico, Virginia was her venue. While in the Marines, she met her future husband in Memphis, Tennessee. Two weeks later, he was sent to Vietnam, and Paula returned to school. They were married twenty four hours after he returned on leave, and stayed married for over forty years until he passed away earlier this year.

In John Serfling's car was Loretta Krook, the youngest of the contingent. Her time with

the Marines went from 1982 to 1986 and was spent at the Washington Navy Shipyard, in Washington, D.C.

Finally, riding with Larry and me was Jo Slater. She served in the Reserves in Boston, her home town, from 1952 to 1960. At that time, it was the biggest reserve unit in the country. She was at Camp LeJeune and Parris Island. Her job was to interview new recruits and assign them their M.O.S. (Military Occupational Specialty).

It's always an honor for our club to escort members and former members of the U.S. military (is there such a thing as an ex-Marine?) in these national holiday parades. They are always appreciative of our club and the fine automobiles we bring. And we are appreciative of their service to our country.


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
