The owner must certify that the vehicle will not be driven more than 4500 miles per year. Having passed the House, HB13-1071 has advanced to the Senate where there will be additional hearings.

CHRISTMAS CHARITY DONATIONS: We collected \$ 104.00 and the total to date is \$ 527.00


As usual the club will provide pizza and refreshments.

CHEROKEE RANCH TOUR AND LUNCH AT THE COUNTRY CLUB AT CASTLE PINES FROM DON BRADEN


RETURN TO CHEROKEE RANCH

If you didn't go the last time we visited, Sunday, June 30, is your chance. We meet at the ranch parking lot and will tour the Castle from 10:00 to 11:30, then drive our Cadillacs for lunch to the nearby Castle Pines Country Club at Noon. The meal will be outside, weather permitting, perhaps under a tent, with some great views of the front range of the Rocky Mountains. The meal includes your choice of salads, assorted vegetables, carving stations with lamb chops or salmon, plus drinks and dessert. This will be their first car show, with our own exclusive parking. The \$50 package includes the tour (\$15 per person); lunch is \$35 each (includes tax and tip). Sorry, no children's rates or senior discounts. Please send payment to Nancy Tucker by Friday, June 21, so we can get an accurate head count (checks payable to RMRCLC).

The house itself is a unique 1450's Scottish-style Castle, built by noted Denver architect Burnham Hoyt in 1924-26, and is filled with fine art, furnishings and memorabilia collected by Mildred Montigue Genevieve Kimball, also known as "Tweet," who lived there from 1954-1999. You will learn on the tour how she bought the castle in 1954 and established Cherokee Ranch as the home of her Santa Gertrudis cattle breeding operation. Today, the 3,100-acre ranch is a cultural and educational hub for the performing arts, including the Colorado Symphony Chamber Music, DU's Lamont School of Music and many others. It is also a wildlife sanctuary, thanks to Tweet, available for nature hikes and lectures, and is protected through a conservation easement, with a small herd of Santa Gertrudis cattle still bred on the land.

What you may not know is that my twin sister Charlotte and I attended our dad's marriage to Tweet in 1968, I lived in the former chauffeur's quarters at the ranch that summer and did ranch work with her two sons, Richard and Kirk. The three of us are about the same age and put up fences, cleared brush from the back road (the same one that gets you to the house today) and worked with the cattle. We also made several trips to see the famous melodrama at the Imperial Hotel in Cripple Creek, with Tweet, always the matchmaker, personally making sure we escorted the proper young ladies. I visited the ranch many times over the years at Tweet's invitation, including experience as a ranch hand and exhibitor with some of her animals at the 1972 National Western Stock Show and Rodeo. That's another story.

Cherokee Ranch and Castle hasn't been open to the public except by family invitation for most of the last 75 years. If you've always heard of "that castle in Denver," this is it ([www.cherokeeranch.org/about us](http://www.cherokeeranch.org/about-us)). Don't miss it! 





Memorial Day Parade FROM JIM SALMI

Our region again drove in the downtown Denver Memorial Day Parade on Saturday, May 25 and all went well. We drove members of the Women Marines Association and the Gold Star Wives, and we had some additional veteran riders as well, who met us downtown at the form-up location. Again this year, our members turned out in force, with a total of nine Cadillacs. It was a good thing, since the number of riders was a little higher than it has been in some years in the past. Ken Read, one of our newer members, brought his beautiful '67 Eldorado, (bought new by his grandfather). While participation in the parade was good, once again the number of spectators downtown was low. The media doesn't seem to publicize this event, and it's hard to know how to drum up interest. The theme of this year's parade was "Remembering Those Who Made the Ultimate Sacrifice". The parade was followed by the Veterans Memorial Day Tribute on the west side of the state capitol.

WHAT DOES THE CLC DO FOR ITS REGIONS? FROM TIM COY ~ CLC SOUTHWEST REGIONS VICE PRESIDENT

1. The Cadillac & LaSalle Club, Inc. (CLC) pays the annual premium on a \$5 million insurance policy to protect Regions from liability during official events. This policy covers only Region members who also belong to the National CLC; therefore, non-National members are **not** covered and thus leave the Region open to liability. *This insurance policy is the reason National CLC membership is required of all Regional members.*
2. The CLC promotes all Regions with a listing containing contact information nine months each year in the outer wrap of *The Self-Starter*. Regions are also promoted with listings and contact information in the *International Membership Directory* and on the CLC website, offering worldwide coverage.
3. The CLC maintains a calendar on its website promoting Region events; in fact, the CLC is seeking an Event Calendar coordinator, whose job will be going through newsletters on a regular basis in order to add more Regional events to this calendar. Members from other areas of the country check this calendar in order to take advantage of Regional events during their travels.
4. The CLC gives Regions the opportunity to bid on hosting Grand Nationals and National Driving Tours, which bring fellow members together from around the world.
5. The CLC does *not* require its Regions to pay “franchise” fees, unlike a company that has franchises (similar in setup to the CLC).
6. The CLC offers the services of Regional vice presidents, who work closely with Regions to help them grow and prosper.
7. The CLC offers each Region **free** ads in *The Self-Starter* and in the *International Membership Directory* to sell products as fundraisers (with prior board approval).
8. The CLC has marketing materials available to its Regions via a slick “Join Us!” rack card, and will supply extra copies of *The Self-Starter* upon request to pass out at Regional events. All Regions have to do is contact the CLC Office to make this happen.
9. Areas covered by Regions enjoy over 50 percent membership; the CLC has help available to Regions wanting to market themselves better in their assigned areas. The easiest way to foster Region growth is to contact folks who belong to National and not to a Region and ask them to join your Region.
10. The CLC Office is operated by professionals who understand how a Region works and are more than willing to work with any Region to answer their questions, help them achieve 100 percent membership status with National, and a myriad of other requests.
11. Each CLC Region may appoint a representative to the National CLC’s board of directors to represent the local club’s interests.
12. Each CLC Region has an opportunity to win National awards, such as the Norm Uhlir Regional Activity Award, the Newsletter Excellence Award and the Web Site Excellence Award.
13. The CLC offers nearby Regions, which, depending on distance, camaraderie and activity possibilities with another CLC-affiliated group.
14. The CLC grooms its officers and board members generally from Regions. History has shown that many Regional officers have been given the opportunity to join the board and/or become a CLC officer. It’s rare for a non-Regional member to “move up” in the Club hierarchy.
15. Each Region is a part of a large network of local, international and special-interest groups called Chapters. The CLC has 48 Regions in the United States; 18 International Affiliates, all outside the U.S.; and 11 Chapters, which represent special Cadillac and LaSalle interests.
16. The CLC provides insurance for Region directors and officers (D&O policies), protecting the Region from wrongdoing by its board.
17. The CLC Office, upon request, provides mailing labels to assist Regions in recruitment of new members.

Regions represent the CLC experience at the local level, and, according to the CLC’s Constitution, “are a cohesive affiliated group of the Club.” Regions give CLC members the most enjoyment out of their membership by offering the opportunity to participate in activities near where they live. The CLC and its chartered Regions, Chapters and International Affiliates have flourished for 55 years, and see a bright future ahead.
