Vintage Aero Flying Museum By John Serfling

For two years, members of our club have been requesting a trip to the Vintage Aero Flying Museum located near Fort Lupton, CO. An opportunity now presents itself. The Vintage Aero Flying Museum is having its grand re-opening on Saturday, May 19, 2007. The day starts with a "dawn" patrol and pancake breakfast at 8:00. Lunch will be served at 11:00. There will be an af-

ternoon patrol flight at 1:30 and festivities wrap up at 3:00. The foundation would really appreciate our participation. They have already arranged for the Model T club to attend, so this would be a great opportunity for those of you who enjoy very old machines to get an eyeful of both airplanes and cars.

The museum contains the largest collection of World War I aviation memorabilia in the world. The memorabilia on display could not be dupli-

cated and the historical value of the planes, uniforms, etc. is priceless. The museum is owned by the LaFayette Foundation in honor of the Americans who served in France prior to America's involvement in World War I. Those men were referred to as "The LaFayette Escadrille & Flying Corps." The foundation preserves their history for future generations. 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


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



**It's Burger Run

busy a background. A carnival in the background draws the eye away from your car.

For the "headline" picture of your car we are looking for a photograph showing both the side (either one) and front of your car, like this photo.



Other than that, show off whatever parts of your car you think deserve attention, whether it's that wonderful engine bay, a beautiful old art deco dashboard, shining chrome, or whatever your fancy!

Not to worry if you drive a Cadillac.

Jesse, our 1996 Eldorado hasn't seen much action this winter. Even with front wheel drive, she doesn't take well to the snow packed driveway with a 23 percent grade. John Serfling swears that he read somewhere that Cadillac boasts that its cars are built to handle an 18 percent grade.

Early March did bring some fine weather and Jesse's tires were starting to look a little flat on their bottoms, so I drove her to work. She came equipped with a "Mission Control Center" a computer that provides more information than you thought you would ever need to know about your vehicle. Thread Chasers By John Washburn

Taps cut threads. Thread chaser taps clean threads. Do not use them interchangeably...

You may have never heard about thread chasing taps and wonder what they are. Well the folks who race dragsters and rebuild them after each run came up with a novel way to clean threads without damaging their integrity. For engines which put out astronomical amounts of horse power this is critically important. So we may want to learn from those who race cars for a living.

I'm sure most of us have used a tap to clean out a bolt hole (the female surface) or on occasion a nut if the bolt is extremely hard to tighten down. Have you ever wondered why the tap ends up cutting metal when used? That is its job to cut threads; so generally, it

will cut new threads each time used. If, for instance you used a tap to clean the threads for the head bolts on your classic car, you would be removing more of the existing threads. This will reduce the overlap of the female threads in the block to the male threads on the bolt. This can result in stripped threads on these larger higher torque bolts.

Prior to thread chaser taps/thread cleaning taps, the knowledgeable old mechanics used old worn taps which mostly cleaned threads without too much thread cutting. Thread chasing taps are designed to clean the threads not cut threads, so there is no degradation in the threads integrity.

Today both Automotive Racing Products (ARP) www.arp-bolts.com or Tavia Performance Specialty Tools and Accessories (Tavia) <http://www.tavia.com/> supply thread cleaning tap sets (1/4", 5/16",

3/8", 7/16", 1/2" and 9/16"). Tavia has a coarse set #01450 and a fine set #01451 at about \$14.00 each. ARP has a coarse set #911-0006, or you can buy them individually.



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
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When I purchased my set 4 or so years ago it came with both coarse and fine tap cleaners plus the die sets to match. They no longer, near as I can figure, make the thread cleaning die sets. Makes sense since you can clean the bolts on a wire wheel or purchase new bolts.

My point is that thread chasing taps are a wonderful innovation. When you need to clean the threads on the nuts that hold your fenders to the body, this is the tool. It will clean but not cut new threads. On engine parts, I think it is imperative to use thread chasers. Using taps may not impact your engine restoration but it may cause grief to the next person who has to work on it. So use thread chasers to clean threads.
