Summer Driving Tour Re-Cap By John Cullinan

Summer driving tours have become something to look forward to in recent years. We have had some very enjoyable tours: Taos, Durango, Steamboat, western Kansas, and this year's tour to Wyoming.

Starting at the visitor's center at the Bud Brewery, 15 cars drove to our first stop: The Union Pacific steam shop. 29 participants enjoyed an informative tour led by Jim Leonard and Jim Coker who work for UP and who travel with the giant steam locomotives when they roll under their own power to events around the country. This year they will be at Rail Week in North Platte, Nebraska and will participate in the celebration of the 100 anniversary of statehood for Arizona and New Mexico. Yes, next year is the anniversary but the partying begins this year.

During our tour of the steam shop we were allowed to climb into the cab of one of the steam engines and also go inside a 100 year old presidential sleeping car that is still used when the engines are on tour. We got to go inside the last remaining of 8 roundhouses that surrounded the still functioning turntable, we also saw a snow blower used to clear the tracks so rescue crews could get to stranded locomotives and do the back-breaking work of removing all snow from under and around them. I hope all the participants appreciated the fact that Union Pacific let us visit their working Steam Shop. The steam shop is not a museum or a tourist site. It is a fully operating steam engine repair and maintenance shop that is still being used as it was 140 years ago.




After the steam shop tour we drove to the newly updated Little America Hotel and Resort where we had a surprisingly good buffet lunch. If you are ever in Cheyenne, I recommend you have a meal at Little America.

After lunch the group split up to visit any site they pleased. My faction visited the very unique Nelson Museum, the State Capitol, and the Plains Hotel, which has been renovated but maintains much of its original interior. Most of us drove on to Laramie via route 210 that climbs to 8500 feet as it winds through some interesting geography north of I-80. Before joining I-80 and descending into Laramie, we stopped at the Lincoln Highway

Monument and the Henry Joy Monument. Henry Joy was a driving force in establishing the Lincoln Highway and was also a founder of Packard Motors. After a few more miles on modern I-80, we arrived at our home for the night, the Comfort Inn. We all were free to dine where we wished. Roseann and I and 5 others dined at Jeffrey's where we were seated promptly, and savored an excellent meal and Malbec wine worthy of John Washburn for only \$17 a bottle. Eat at Jeffrey's if you are ever in Laramie.

Friday morning we drove directly to the Iverson Mansion, or at least most of us did.



Our tour leader, me, drove 5 streets too far north before turning back to the correct street. Once at the Ivinson we paid our entrance fee and congregated out front of this impressive mansion built in 1898. While waiting for our tour guides, we were amazed by the variety of architectural treatments on this fine home. After a cordial welcome by the director of the mansion, we entered and received a short history lesson on the home and its builder, Edward Ivinson, one of the original Laramie pioneers in 1867. Like the Thatchers of Pueblo, he started out with general store that turned into a bank where he provided safe storage of money for clients and loans to others.

In you get a chance, visit the Ivinson Mansion. It is one of the finest mansions I have visited, including those in Newport, Rhode Island. The quality of workmanship found in the interior and the quality of the furniture and historical articles are superior to those my fellow tourers had seen in Denver or Colorado Springs. Rosemont, the Thatcher home in Pueblo, is one we hope to see next year if John Washburn, and Bill Woodman can organize a



summer driving tour there next year. Art Cutler and Whit Otis will also be working on making next year's tour a memorable one. I look forward to comparing Rosemont and the Ivinson Mansion. After a group lunch, we drove to the Wyoming Territorial Prison museum. Our guide there, as were our guides at the Ivinson Mansion, was an informative and enthusiastic one. I have driven by the museum many times over the last 45 years but had never stopped. Our guide, a former New Yorker, imparted lots of new information to us that put the prison in its historical context and

highlighted the lives the inmates endured, including inmate Butch Cassidy. The tour ended with a demonstration of the craft of broom making, which the inmates produced on the grounds. After getting out of prison, we followed the Snowy Range Highway, 130, up and over the Snowy Pass to Saratoga. It was a little cloudy but we were able to see the scenic lakes, rock cliffs and mountain summits before descending into the Saratoga valley. We stayed at the Saratoga Resort where most of us enjoyed the hot spring pools and the relaxing setting. Some of us had dinner at the resort while others went into town to dine. After dinner many of us met at the brew pub inside the resort and partook of some hearty libations.





Saturday was a free day, but a large percentage of us ended up at the Encampment, Wyoming, museum. Again we encountered another excellent guide who had so much information to impart I would have gladly taken the tour twice. The museum has a number of local buildings that have been moved there from various parts of the Saratoga Valley. Encampment had once been involved in the big Copper Boom of the early 1900's and once had a 16 mile aerial tramway that carried copper from the mine down the mountain to Smelters in town. Saturday night was the night of our special group dinner at the Old Baldy Club. The Old Baldy was founded in 1964 by well-to-do locals and out-of-staters such as Mr. Hall of Hallmark cards. Through a local contact, I was able to get us into the club for dinner. Before dinner we drove around the grounds and saw the fine homes and splendid views. Then we settled into the Eagles Nest room for drinks which were followed by a fine dinner and dessert. I hope all our participants enjoyed their meal. I know I enjoyed mine and also enjoyed hav-

ing the opportunity to get to know some of our members better. After dinner a number of us went back to the hot springs at the Saratoga Resort, while others watched from the steps in front of their rooms and had a few more drinks. All in all, I think the participants were glad they had signed up for the tour. No one had any serious car problems and we all made it home without incident, although we split up and took different routes home.

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
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Year of Manufacture Plates

I am going to put a "Year of Manufacture" plate on my '67. I have plates that I have used in parades and such but I remembered some member talking about the fact you can always have an old plate on your car. I talked to a person at the DMV and they gave me a form to fill out and obtain authorization to use a plate with the year of my car. I figure other members might be interested so here is what you need to do in Colorado.

1. Get form DR 2818. You can download it from: <http://www.colorado.gov> search for [DR 2818](#) and this [description](#) at the bottom of CRS 42-3-219.
2. Fill out the form and send it in with a picture of the plate you want to use, proof of insurance and current registration.
3. After receiving DR 2818 authorization you can put an old plate on your car and keep the authorization, current registration and current plates in the car.
4. There are restrictions, ok for things you would normally do with a collector car, not going back and forth to work all the time.

For New Mexico, use [MVD-11317](#), <http://www.mvd.newmexico.gov>.

For Montana I am unable to find anything, <http://www.doj.mt.gov/>. Same problem with Wyoming, <http://www.dot.state.wy.us/wydot/>. If a member knows a way to do this in these states, send Dave a note and he will put it in the Dagmar.
